#### RE: Notice of Intent to Sue Pursuant to the Emergency Planning and Community Right-to-Know Act, 42 U.S.C. § 11046: <u>Newark Comprehensive Emergency Response Plan</u>

Dear Messrs. Pruitt, Christie, and Fuentes:

This letter constitutes notice pursuant to Section 326(d) of the Emergency Planning and Community Right-to-Know Act, 42 U.S.C. § 11046(d) ("EPCRA"), that the Ironbound Community Corporation ("ICC") intends to file suit against the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency ("EPA"), State of New Jersey ("State"), and the New Jersey State Emergency Response Commission ("NJ SERC") for failure to provide public access to the comprehensive emergency response plan that covers Newark, New Jersey, in violation of EPCRA.

This letter constitutes notice that, unless the violations described in detail below cease within sixty (60) days of your receipt of this letter, ICC intends to file a civil action in the United States District Court for the District of New Jersey seeking (i) a declaratory judgment that the State and the NJ SERC have failed to appoint an EPCRA-compliant local emergency planning committee for the Newark emergency planning district, in violation of EPCRA; (ii) a declaratory judgment that EPA, the State, and the NJ SERC have failed to provide for the public availability

of the comprehensive emergency response plan for the Newark emergency planning district, in violation of EPCRA; (iii) injunctive relief directing the State and the NJ SERC to promptly appoint an LEPC for the Newark emergency planning district that meets the requirements of EPCRA; (iv) injunctive relief directing EPA, the State, and the NJ SERC to promptly prepare and make publicly available, through the Newark LEPC, a comprehensive emergency response plan that meets the requirements of EPCRA; and (v) judgment awarding ICC costs of litigation, including reasonable attorney and expert witness fees. 42 U.S.C. § 11046(a)(1)(C), (f).

## I. ENVIRONMENTAL SETTING OF NEWARK'S CHEMICAL-STORING FACILITIES AND THE SURROUNDING COMMUNITIES

Newark's rapid industrial growth since the 1800's brought waves of residents to the city, helping to establish its current-day status as the most populous city in New Jersey and second most populous in the New York metropolitan area. But Newark's industrial history has left a modern-day hodgepodge of contaminated sites and industrial facilities that store hazardous chemicals near areas of high population density, as exemplified by the Ironbound neighborhood of Newark's East Ward.

Ironbound Community Corporation is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit that serves residents of the Ironbound neighborhood through children's and family programs and community organizing and advocacy. Nearly a fifth of the City's population lives in the four square miles of the Ironbound neighborhood, making it one of the most densely populated areas of Newark. It is also one of the most diverse, with two-thirds of the population born outside the United States. Over a quarter of the population is below the poverty level. These Ironbound residents live among more than 200 facilities that store and use hazardous materials on site. Over 70 of these facilities store a large enough volume of hazardous chemicals to trigger the requirement to submit hazardous chemicals inventory forms.

These hazardous sites include the former Diamond Alkali Agent Orange plant, which is now a Superfund site with the world's largest concentration of dioxin, one of the most toxic chemicals on the planet. *See* Laura Mansnerus, *Newark's Toxic Tomb; Six Acres Fouled by Dioxin, Agent Orange's Deadly Byproduct, Reside in the Shadow of an Awakening Downtown*, N.Y. Times, Nov. 8, 1998, http://www.nytimes.com/1998/11/08/nyregion/newark-s-toxic-tombsix-acres-fouled-dioxin-agent-orange-s-deadly-byproduct.html. Ironbound is also home to Doremus Avenue, a thoroughfare nicknamed "Chemical Row" for its high concentration of facilities that store hazardous chemicals and other flammable substances, often located dangerously close to one another. The Newark Energy Center (a natural gas plant), for example, stores over 270,000 lbs. of sulfuric acid a year, and just across the street is an oil terminal with a capacity of over 1 million barrels of oil. In the last 20 years, multiple explosions, fires, spills, and accidental releases of hazardous chemicals have occurred at facilities along Doremus Avenue and other Ironbound areas.

ICC has grave concerns that this history of explosions, fires, and toxics spills will only continue. In particular, ICC is worried that the lack of comprehensive emergency response planning in Newark threatens to needlessly exacerbate the potential harms from future industrial accidents. As outlined in Section III, *infra*, ICC has sought to obtain access to a comprehensive

emergency response plan for the Newark emergency planning district, but has been denied access by the NJ SERC and the Newark Office of Emergency Management at every turn.

# II. LEGAL BACKGROUND OF EPCRA AND EMERGENCY PLANNING IN NEW JERSEY

Modern emergency management and preparedness law in New Jersey began in 1942 with the enactment of the New Jersey Civilian Defense and Disaster Control Act, N.J. Stat. Ann. App. A:9-33 *et seq.* That Act was originally created to respond to the "war emergency" and required every municipality to create a "local defense council" to further the emergency management goals of the Act. 1942 N.J. Laws Ch. 251 § 9.

Decades later, in 1986, Congress passed EPCRA, 42 U.S.C. § 11001 *et seq.*, in response to a different type of emergency: deadly releases of toxic chemicals from Union Carbide plants in Bhopal, India and Institute, West Virginia. Congress's purpose in enacting EPCRA was to "establish programs to provide the public with important information on the hazardous chemicals in their communities, and to establish emergency planning and notification requirements which would protect the public in the event of a release of hazardous chemicals." H.R. Rep. No. 99-962, at 281 (1986) (Conf. Rep.), *reprinted in* 1986 U.S.C.C.A.N. 3276, 3374.

To achieve these ends, EPCRA requires each state to establish a state emergency response commission ("SERC"). 42 U.S.C. § 11001(a). This commission, in turn, must designate emergency planning districts within the state "in order to facilitate preparation and implementation of emergency of plans." *Id.* § 11001(b). EPCRA also requires that a state's SERC appoint members representing various stakeholder groups to a local emergency planning committee ("LEPC") for each such district. *Id.* § 11001(c). One of the primary responsibilities of the LEPC is to create a "[c]omprehensive emergency response plan[]" that identifies emergency risks within the district and establishes procedures to mitigate or respond to those risks. *Id.* § 11003.

As the very name of the Emergency Planning and Community Right-to-Know Act suggests, community engagement is an essential component of EPCRA. As EPA explains,

LEPCs . . . serve as a community focal point for information and discussion about hazardous substances, emergency planning, and health and environmental risks. *Engaging and educating the community is an important part of meeting the goals of EPCRA*, especially for those members of the community identified in the local response plan that could be directly affected by the impacts of a chemical accident. Section 301 contains provisions for LEPCs ... . to notify the public of its activities and hold public meetings to discuss the emergency plan with the community, educate the public about chemical risks, and share information on what is to be done during an emergency (i.e., evacuation or shelter-in-place). . . . *LEPCs . . . should encourage the public and community groups to become LEPC . . . members, participate in the planning process, and promote participation in emergency exercises*. Additionally,

LEPCs . . . should consider focused outreach (i.e., addressing language and cultural issues) to vulnerable, sensitive, and low income members of the community to assist them in effectively participating in the local planning meetings, understanding risk issues, and what to do when an accident occurs.

Office of Solid Waste & Emergency Response, EPA, 550-F-15-002, How to Better Prepare Your Community for a Chemical Emergency: A Guide for State, Tribal and Local Agencies 9 (2015) ("EPA EPCRA Guide") (attached as Attachment 1) (emphasis added).

EPCRA's requirements for community involvement in the emergency planning process is reflected in the requirement that the LEPC must be composed of various stakeholders from the community. As EPA explains,

It is important that the members of the LEPC . . . represent all stakeholders in their community. EPCRA states that LEPC . . . membership shall include, at a minimum, representatives from these entities:

- Elected state and local officials
- · Law enforcement
- Civil defense
- Transportation
- · Broadcast and print media
- Hospital
- Fire fighters
- First aid
- Local environmental
- Health
- Community groups
- · Facility owners and/or operators

Representatives from each of these organizations play an important role in developing the local emergency plan and protecting the public during chemical emergencies.

For many communities, a successful LEPC . . . acts as a forum to support the overall emergency management program within the community. Stakeholders bring their specific expertise and talents into the planning process to ensure all elements of the plan are appropriately addressed. For example, facility owners and operators who know and understand the chemical risks at their facility can assist the LEPC . . . in identifying actions to take in order to prepare for and respond to a chemical accident. Members of the public also have a role to play in assisting the LEPC . . . in understanding the unique needs of the community regarding communication about the

chemical risks and emergency response procedures. For example, individuals with special medical needs, such as the elderly, disabled/handicapped, children, and those with transportation challenges. Tailoring outreach to meet the specific considerations of the local community is key to enabling effective participation in the planning process and an efficient response to ensure safety of the public.

#### Id. at 4–5.

Not only must the community be involved in the emergency planning process, but the comprehensive emergency response plan itself must be made available to the public. As EPA explains,

EPCRA requires that [emergency planning] information be made available to the public. Fence-line Communities located close to chemical facilities will find this information useful to help them understand chemical risks and prepare for chemical accidents. Information that would be most helpful includes:

- The local response plan that identifies the potential chemical risks to their community and response actions to be taken;
- How the public will receive information on these risks, as well as how they will receive notification when a chemical accident occurs; and
- What they need to do to prepare for a chemical accident and how to protect themselves once they receive the notification that a chemical accident has occurred.

SERCs...[and] LEPCs... are required to establish procedures for processing and receiving requests from the public as well as providing that information to community members. Procedures may include setting-up a reading room, establishing hours of operation, determining if copies of the reports can be made, and determining if service fees will be charged.

#### Id. at 10.

Soon after the enactment of EPCRA, the Governor and legislature of New Jersey took steps to ensure that New Jersey law complied with the new federal mandates. In 1987, New Jersey Governor Thomas Kean issued Executive Order No. 161 to establish the New Jersey State Emergency Response Commission ("NJ SERC"). N.J. Exec. Order No. 161 ¶¶ 1–3 (Feb. 13, 1987), 1987 N.J. Laws 2048, <u>http://njlegallib.rutgers.edu/eo/docs/kean/order161-/index.pdf</u>. The Executive Order directs the NJ SERC to use existing political subdivisions consistent with the Civilian Defense and Disaster Control Act when designating the emergency planning districts. *Id.*  $\P$  4.

Then, in 1989, the New Jersey legislature amended the Civilian Defense and Disaster Control Act. 1989 N.J. Laws 1206–15. The amended law requires every New Jersey municipality to create a "local emergency management council" in place of the "local defense council" required by previous versions of the statute. N.J. Stat. Ann. App. A:9-41; *compare* 1989 N.J. Laws 1208 *with* 1942 N.J. Laws 683. In addition, the amended law provides: "Each county and municipality in the State shall prepare a written Emergency Operations Plan with all appropriate annexes necessary to implement the plan." N.J. Stat. Ann. App. A:9-43.2. The law further specifies: "Each county and municipal Emergency Operations Plan *shall conform to all relevant federal and State statutes, rules and regulations* concerning emergency operations and shall include the identification of significant hazards affecting the jurisdiction." Id. App. A:9-43.3 (emphasis added).

Thus, while EPCRA required the creation of "LEPC's" and the Civilian Defense and Disaster Control Act required the creation of "local emergency management councils," Executive Order 161 "integrated [the] responsibilities" of these two entities. Captain Dennis DelFava, N.J. Office of Emergency Management, LEPC's Enhance Local Disaster Plans, Resources (2002), <u>http://www.state.nj.us/njoem/preparedness\_lepcart.html</u> (attached as Attachment 2). As a result, "*in policy and in practice*, members of the LEPC and the emergency management council were representing the same agencies; and emergency management councils became known as 'LEPC's." *Id.* (emphasis in original).

## III. ICC'S ATTEMPTS TO ACCESS NEWARK'S EMERGENCY PLANNING DOCUMENTS

ICC sought access under EPCRA to Newark's comprehensive emergency response plan from the NJ SERC and the Newark Office of Emergency Management ("Newark OEM"), but has been denied at every turn.

## A. ICC's March 24 Letter to the Newark OEM and NJ SERC

On March 27, 2017, ICC Executive Director Joseph Della Fave emailed a letter, dated March 24, 2017, to Colonel Joseph Rick Fuentes, Director of the NJ SERC, and Dorian Herrell, Director of the Newark OEM. *See* Letter from Joseph Della Fave, Executive Dir., ICC to Col. Joseph Rick Fuentes, Dir., State Office of Emergency Mgmt. & Dorian Herrell, Dir., Newark OEM (Mar. 24, 2017) ("March 24 Letter") (attached as Attachment 3). The March 24 Letter requested to inspect Newark's comprehensive emergency response plan and a number of documents regarding selected facilities in Newark under EPCRA and the New Jersey Worker and Community Right to Know Act ("CRTK"). Specifically, ICC requested to inspect:

- The Newark LEPC's emergency response plan under EPCRA, 42 U.S.C. § 11003; and
- With respect to each facility listed in the table below, all of the following documents in the possession of the [NJ] SERC/Newark LEPC:
  - o Material safety data sheets
  - List of chemicals for which the facility must prepare a material safety data sheet

- EPCRA Tier I and Tier II inventory forms
- CRTK environmental survey forms

*Id.* at 1. The letter noted that "EPCRA requires all SERCs/LEPCs to make these documents available to the general public during normal working hours." *Id.* (citing 42 U.S.C. § 11044; 40 C.F.R. § 370.63). The March 24 Letter also asked for a list of all members of the Newark LEPC. *Id.* at 2.

### B. NJ SERC's Response to the March 24 Letter

On April 13, 2017, ICC Environmental Justice Policy Manager Molly Greenberg contacted the NJ SERC, through the New Jersey Division of State Police, about the status of their response to the March 24 Letter. The NJ SERC informed Ms. Greenberg that it was coordinating with other divisions of the New Jersey Office of the Attorney General on the matter. On May 4, 2017, Ms. Greenberg emailed the NJ SERC to ask if there was a timeline for a response from the NJ SERC, and was informed by Phyllis Wilt-Houck, Executive Assistant to Col. Fuentes, that ICC should receive a response "any day now."

On May 11, 2017, ICC received via mail a letter from Col. Fuentes dated April 25, 2017. That letter states, in full,

The New Jersey [SERC] does not maintain copies of local emergency response plans. The plans are kept on file at the local jurisdictions where the facility resides.

The SERC, through the New Jersey Office of Emergency Management, has provided training on the requirements of [EPCRA] to the City of Newark. Your request for information should be directed to the Newark Office of Emergency Management.

Letter from Col. Joseph R. Fuentes, Superintendent, Div. of State Police, to Joseph Della Fave, Executive Dir., ICC (Apr. 25, 2017) (attached as Attachment 4).

The April 25, 2017 letter did not address ICC's request for facility-specific documents or for a list of the members of the Newark LEPC. *See id.* Accordingly, on June 1, 2017, ICC emailed another letter, dated May 30, 2017, alerting the NJ SERC to the fact that ICC sought other information in addition to the emergency response plan, and asking the NJ SERC for a complete response. *See* Letter from Joseph Della Fave, Executive Dir., ICC, to Col. Joseph Rick Fuentes, Dir., State Office of Emergency Management (May 30, 2017) (attached as Attachment 5).

On June 12, 2017, Col. Fuentes responded to the follow-up letter as follows, in full,

The [NJ SERC] does not maintain copies of local emergency response plans, material safety data sheets, chemical lists, EPCRA

Tier I and Tier II inventory forms or Community Right to Know (CRTK) environmental survey forms.

Although the SERC may not maintain the requested documents, they may be available for review through other means. Your request for information should be directed to the Newark Office of Emergency Management

Letter from Col. Joseph R. Fuentes, Superintendent, Div. of State Police, to Joseph Della Fave, Executive Dir., ICC (June 12, 2017) (attached as Attachment 6).

### C. Newark OEM's Response to the March 24 Letter

After receiving the March 24 Letter, the Newark OEM initially scheduled a meeting for April 13, 2017 between Ms. Greenberg of ICC and Deputy Coordinator for Newark OEM Juba Dowdell, but that meeting was cancelled. One month later, on May 11, 2017, Newark OEM Director Dorian Herrell met with Ms. Greenberg and indicated that he was not aware if they were in possession of all the requested documents, but would check and follow up in about a week. On or about June 7, 2017, Mr. Dowdell informed Mr. Della Fave that the Newark OEM has responsive documents but that ICC must submit a request to the City of Newark under the New Jersey Open Public Records Act, N.J. Stat. Ann. § 47:1A-1 *et seq.* ("OPRA"), in order to access the documents.

Although EPCRA requires public access to these documents upon request without the need for a formal public records request, on June 28, 2017, ICC followed Mr. Dowdell's instructions and submitted an OPRA request to the City of Newark, dated June 19, 2017, seeking the various facility-specific information requested in the March 24 Letter. Joseph Della Fave, ICC, New Jersey Government Records Request Form (completed June 19, 2017) (attached as Attachment 7). On June 29, 2017, Ms. Greenberg emailed Mr. Dowdell to notify him that the OPRA request was submitted, and on June 30, 2017, Mr. Dowdell responded that the request would be processed by the following week.

On July 19, 2017, ICC was informed that the OPRA request could not be processed because it used a single form to request documents concerning multiple facilities. Accordingly, that same day, ICC submitted multiple OPRA requests for the same documents requested in the June 19, 2017 OPRA request, but this time using a separate form for each facility. Joseph Della Fave, ICC, New Jersey Government Records Request Forms (completed July 19, 2017) (attached as Attachment 8). On or about July 31, 2017, the City of Newark responded to ICC's facility-specific OPRA requests with CRTK forms for 12 of the 13 facilities that were part of the request, and material safety data sheets for one of the 13 facilities.

On July 25, 2017, ICC submitted a separate OPRA request for access to Newark's comprehensive emergency response plan, as ICC had initially requested in the March 24 Letter. Molly Greenberg, ICC, New Jersey Government Records Request Form (completed July 25, 2017) (attached as Attachment 9). In a letter dated August 3, 2017 – over four months after ICC requested access to the plan in the March 24 Letter – the OPRA Unit of the City Clerk responded to this OPRA request by attaching a memorandum dated August 1, 2017 from the Newark OEM.

Letter from Kenneth Louis, City Clerk, City of Newark, to Molly Greenberg, ICC (Aug. 3, 2017); Memorandum from Juba Dowdell, Deputy Coordinator, OEM & Homeland Security, to Ana Golinski, Office of the Clerk (Aug. 1, 2017) (the letter and attached memorandum are attached as Attachment 10). That memorandum stated, in full,

With regard to this request, this record type is considered exempt from disclosure pursuant to the referenced Statute, Regulation, Rule, or other law: [N.J. Stat. Ann. §] 47:1A-9a

*Id.* To date, ICC has not received a response to its request for a list of the members of the Newark LEPC.

## IV. THE STATE AND THE NJ SERC'S VIOLATIONS OF EPCRA

The citizen suit provision of EPCRA states that "any person may commence a civil action on his own behalf against . . . [t]he [EPA] Administrator, a State Governor, or a State emergency response commission, for failure to provide a mechanism for public availability of information in accordance with section 11044(a) of this title." 42 U.S.C. § 11046(a)(1). Section 11044(a), in turn, provides that "[e]ach emergency response plan . . . shall be made available to the general public . . . during normal working hours at the location or locations designated by the [EPA] Administrator, Governor, [SERC], or [LEPC], as appropriate." *Id.* § 11044(a).

As set forth in detail below, EPA, the State, and the NJ SERC have violated and continue to violate EPCRA by failing to "provide a mechanism for public availability" of an EPCRA-compliant comprehensive emergency response plan for Newark, New Jersey. To ICC's knowledge, in violation of EPCRA: (1) the Newark emergency planning district has no LEPC that meets the requirements of EPCRA; and (2) EPA, the State, and the NJ SERC have failed to make publicly available an EPCRA-compliant comprehensive emergency response plan for the Newark emergency planning district.

## A. Failure to Appoint an LEPC that Meets the Requirements of EPCRA

As noted above, EPCRA requires the Governor of each State to appoint a State emergency response commission. 42 U.S.C. § 11001(a). The State emergency response commission, in turn, must designate emergency planning districts "in order to facilitate preparation and implementation of emergency plans," and "shall appoint members to a local emergency planning committee for each emergency planning district." *Id.* § 11001(b), (c). The State emergency response commission "shall supervise and coordinate the activities of such [LEPCs]." *Id.* § 11001(a).

As for the composition of the LEPC, EPCRA specifies,

Each [LEPC] shall include, at a minimum, representatives from each of the following groups or organizations: elected State and local officials; law enforcement, civil defense, firefighting, first aid, health, local environmental, hospital, and transportation personnel; broadcast and print media; community groups; and owners and operators of facilities subject to the requirements of this subchapter.

#### *Id.* § 11001(c).

The NJ SERC has made public a list of contacts for each of the LEPC's in the state. NJ SERC, Appendix 2 Local Emergency Planning Committee (LEPC) Addresses (rev. June 2016) (attached as Attachment 11). That list includes the Newark OEM as the contact for the Newark LEPC. *Id.* at 7 (listing previous Newark OEM Director Keith Isaac as contact). The composition of the Newark OEM, however, does not meet EPCRA's requirements for the composition of an LEPC. To ICC's knowledge, the Newark emergency planning district does not have an LEPC that includes representatives from any of the categories required by EPCRA, such as elected State and local officials; law enforcement, civil defense, firefighting, first aid, health, local environmental, hospital, and transportation personnel; broadcast and print media; community groups; or owners and operators of facilities subject to EPCRA. *See* 42 U.S.C. § 11001(c). ICC requested a list of the members of the Newark LEPC from the NJ SERC and the Newark OEM, but both entities failed to provide that list or even address that request. *See supra* Section III.

It appears that the Newark OEM has been acting as the de facto LEPC for the Newark emergency planning district. Thus, it appears that the Newark emergency planning district has no LEPC within the meaning of EPCRA, constituting a violation of that statute. *See* 42 U.S.C. § 11001(c) ("Not later than [August 17, 1987], the State emergency response commission shall appoint members of [an LEPC] for each emergency planning district. Each [LEPC] shall include, at a minimum, representatives from each of the following groups or organizations . . .").

## B. Failure to Make Publicly Available a Comprehensive Emergency Response Plan for Newark

EPCRA requires each LEPC to "complete preparation of an emergency plan in accordance with [EPCRA]" and to review that plan at least once a year. *Id.* § 11003(a). The LEPC "shall submit a copy of the plan to the State emergency response commission .... [and] [t]he commission shall review the plan and make recommendations to the [LEPC] on revisions of the plan that may be necessary to ensure coordination of such plan with emergency response plans of other emergency planning districts." *Id.* § 11003(e).

EPCRA requires each comprehensive emergency response plan to include the following nine categories of information:

(1) Identification of facilities subject to the requirements of [EPCRA] that are within the emergency planning district, identification of routes likely to be used for the transportation of substances on the list of extremely hazardous substances referred to in section 11002(a) of [EPCRA], and identification of additional facilities contributing or subjected to additional risk due to their proximity to facilities subject to the requirements of [EPCRA], such as hospitals or natural gas facilities.

(2) Methods and procedures to be followed by facility owners and operators and local emergency and medical personnel to respond to any release of such substances.

(3) Designation of a community emergency coordinator and facility emergency coordinators, who shall make determinations necessary to implement the plan.

(4) Procedures providing reliable, effective, and timely notification by the facility emergency coordinators and the community emergency coordinator to persons designated in the emergency plan, and to the public, that a release has occurred (consistent with the emergency notification requirements of section 11004 of [EPCRA]).

(5) Methods for determining the occurrence of a release, and the area or population likely to be affected by such release.

(6) A description of emergency equipment and facilities in the community and at each facility in the community subject to the requirements of [EPCRA], and an identification of the persons responsible for such equipment and facilities.

(7) Evacuation plans, including provisions for a precautionary evacuation and alternative traffic routes.

(8) Training programs, including schedules for training of local emergency response and medical personnel.

(9) Methods and schedules for exercising the emergency plan.

*Id.* § 11003(c). Each comprehensive emergency plan must include these nine items, but can include other provisions as necessary. *Id.* 

EPCRA requires that this "emergency response plan . . . shall be made available to the general public, consistent with section 11042 of [EPCRA],<sup>1</sup> during normal working hours at the location or locations designated by the [EPA] Administrator, Governor, State emergency response commission, or [LEPC], as appropriate." *Id.* § 11044(a). The LEPC must annually publish a notice in local newspapers that the comprehensive emergency response plan has been submitted, and such notice "shall announce that members of the public who wish to review any such plan . . . may do so at the location designated" by the EPA Administrator, Governor, SERC, or LEPC. *Id.* § 11044(b).

As EPA explains, "SERCs . . . [and] LEPCs . . . are required to establish procedures for processing and receiving requests from the public as well as providing that information to

community members. Procedures may include setting-up a reading room, establishing hours of operation, determining if copies of the reports can be made, and determining if service fees will be charged." EPA EPCRA Guide, Attachment 1, at 10.

ICC submitted multiple requests to the NJ SERC and the Newark OEM to view the comprehensive emergency response plan for the Newark emergency planning district. The NJ SERC denied the request by indicating that it does not maintain a copy of local comprehensive emergency response plans, and directed ICC to instead contact the Newark OEM for the plan. *See supra* Section III. Upon contacting the Newark OEM, that Office instructed ICC to submit an OPRA request to view the comprehensive emergency response plan. *Id.* After ICC submitted the OPRA request, the Newark OEM denied ICC access to the plan, explaining only that "this record type is considered exempt from disclosure pursuant to the referenced Statute, Regulation, Rule, or other law: [N.J. Stat. Ann. §] 47:1A-9a [OPRA]." *Id.* The Newark OEM provided this denial over four months after ICC initially requested access to the comprehensive emergency response plan.

Denial of a request to access an EPCRA comprehensive emergency response plan certainly does not constitute a mechanism for the public availability of the plan. Indeed, even demanding that community members submit a public records request in order to access the comprehensive emergency response plan does not comport with EPCRA. EPA, the State, and the NJ SERC have therefore failed to provide a mechanism for the public availability of an EPCRA-compliant comprehensive emergency response plan for Newark, in violation of EPCRA. *See* 42 U.S.C. §§ 11044(a), 11046(a)(1)(C).

#### V. CONCLUSION

The violations identified in this letter are based on the most recent information available to ICC and are continuing. ICC intends to file suit regarding the violations described above and to seek (i) a declaratory judgment that the State and the NJ SERC have failed to appoint an EPCRA-compliant local emergency planning committee for the Newark emergency planning district, in violation of EPCRA; (ii) a declaratory judgment that EPA, the State, and the NJ SERC have failed to provide for the public availability of the comprehensive emergency response plan for the Newark emergency planning district, in violation EPCRA; (iii) injunctive relief directing the State and the NJ SERC to promptly appoint an LEPC for the Newark emergency planning district that meets the requirements of EPCRA; (iv) injunctive relief directing EPA, the State, and the NJ SERC to promptly prepare and make publicly available, through the Newark LEPC, a comprehensive emergency response plan that meets the requirements of EPCRA; and (v) judgment awarding ICC costs of litigation, including reasonable attorney and expert witness fees. *Id.* § 11046(a)(1)(C), (f).

## How to Better Prepare Your Community for a Chemical Emergency

## A Guide for State, Tribal and Local Agencies

The Emergency Planning and Community Right-to-Know Act (EPCRA) was passed by Congress in 1986 in response to concerns raised by the major industrial accident that occurred in 1984 in Bhopal, India. In that accident, which killed and disabled hundreds of thousands, the public was unaware of the hazardous chemicals in use and stored at the facility and they lacked information on what to do when accidents occur. Soon after, a chemical accident at a facility in Institute, West Virginia in 1985 raised concerns in the U.S. about local preparedness for chemical emergencies and the availability of information on hazardous chemicals.

The need for EPCRA continues today. More recent incidents have occurred, such as the 2013 West, Texas fertilizer facility ammonium nitrate explosion that killed 15 people, the 2010 explosion and fire at Tesoro Refinery in Anacortes, Washington, that killed seven employees, and the 2012 Chevron Refinery hydrocarbon fire in Richmond, California, that affected 15,000 people in the surrounding area. These incidents highlight the need for continued improvement in a number of areas related to chemical facility safety including the need for greater awareness of chemical hazards present in communities, better planning, and appropriate response to chemical incidents.

On August 1, 2013, the White House issued Executive Order (EO) 13650 on *Improving Chemical Facility Safety and Security*. The Chemical Facility Safety and Security Working Group, established by Executive Order 13650, released the status report entitled *Actions to Improve Chemical Facility Safety and Security – A Shared Commitment* on June 6, 2014, which includes key considerations identified in the process of implementing the EO. Some of those considerations include:

- Strengthening the state and local infrastructure created by EPCRA for emergency planning and preparedness
  - This infrastructure includes State Emergency Response Commissions (SERCs), Tribal Emergency Response Commissions (TERCs), Local Emergency Planning Committees (LEPCs), and Tribal Emergency Planning Committees (TEPCs)
- Ensuring participation of key stakeholders (i.e., community members, emergency responders and industry) in the planning process
- Engaging chemical facilities in preventing, preparing for, and responding to chemical accidents, and
- Ensuring effective communication and notifications to the community members before, during, and following a chemical accident.

# The purpose of EPCRA is to:

- Encourage and support emergency planning efforts at the state, tribal and local levels
- Provide local governments and first responders with information concerning potential chemical hazards present in their planning district
- Prevent, prepare for, and mitigate the effects of a chemical incident, and
- Provide the public with information on chemical risks in their community and information on what to do if a chemical accident occurs.

# OVERVIEW OF EPCRA REQUIREMENTS

#### Emergency Planning

Section 302, the emergency planning provisions of EPCRA, requires facilities to provide notification of the presence of extremely hazardous substances (EHSs) on their sites. Facilities must also provide a representative who will serve as the facility emergency coordinator to the LEPC or TEPC and participate in local emergency planning activities. The LEPCs and TEPCs use this information to develop or modify local emergency response plans as required under Section 303.

Section 303 authorizes LEPCs and TEPCs to request any information that is needed to develop or update their emergency plans from facilities subject to Section 302 requirements.

#### Hazardous Chemical Inventory Reporting

Sections 311 and 312 of EPCRA contain provisions for hazardous chemical inventory reporting, also known as community rightto-know reporting. Facilities that handle hazardous chemicals, defined under the Occupational Safety and Health Act and its implementing regulations, above set threshold amounts are required to provide information on the chemicals, their quantities, locations, and potential hazards.

Section 311 requires facilities to submit a Material Safety Data Sheet, MSDS (or Safety Data Sheet, SDS) for each hazardous chemical, or a list of hazardous chemicals, present at or above the reporting thresholds specified in the implementing regulations. Section 312 requires that facilities submit an inventory of these hazardous chemicals (Tier II form) annually by March 1s The MSDSs or list of chemicals and Tier II form are submitted to the SERC (or TERC), LEPC (or TEPC), and the local fire department.

Information submitted on the Tier II form may also be useful to LEPCs and TEPCs in their planning process since it provides information on other hazardous chemicals as well as EHSs present at the facilities in their community.

#### Emergency Release Notification

Facilities are required to provide immediate notification to the SERCs, TERCs, LEPCs and TEPCs of any releases of EHSs and hazardous substances listed under the Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation, and Liability Act (CERCLA). Soon after a release, facilities are required to provide a written follow-up with additional information regarding the release. The immediate notification and follow-up reports will include: the name and quantity of the chemical released; the media to which the chemical was released; known or anticipated acute or chronic health risks; proper precautions to take (e.g., evacuation or shelter-in-place); actions taken to respond to and contain the release; and advice regarding medical attention necessary for exposed individuals.

LEPCs and TEPCs can use this information to improve their local emergency plan to better prepare for a chemical incident. An actual incident can be used to evaluate and measure the effectiveness of the emergency plan. Effectiveness may be determined by how well the response was undertaken and how the emergency situation was communicated to responders and the community.

# **Roles and Responsibilities under EPCRA**

## SERCs and TERCs

SERCs and TERCs are required to establish emergency planning districts, appoint LEPCs and TEPCs, and supervise and coordinate all activities of the LEPCs and TEPCs in their state or tribal region. SERCs and TERCs should ensure that each planning district has an emergency plan and that emergency exercises are conducted at least once a year. SERCs and TERCs must review the plan and make recommendations to improve the plan, as well as ensure that each LEPC or TEPC plan is coordinated with the plans of neighboring emergency planning districts. SERCs and TERCs should assist LEPCs and TEPCs with community meetings to discuss emergency plans and understand the chemical risks.

## Designation of Additional Facilities Subject to Emergency Planning

While the emergency planning provisions in EPCRA are limited to EHSs and the facilities that handle them, other chemicals and facilities may also pose danger to the community in an emergency. Section 302 authorizes SERCs and TERCs to designate additional facilities subject to emergency planning notification. SERCs and TERCs could consider naming individual sites or companies, or designate certain classes of facilities as ways to expand the number of facilities included in the planning process after public notice and opportunity for comment. EPA encourages SERCs and TERCs to use this authority so these additional facilities and the chemicals they handle would also be subject to emergency planning. This would require these facilities to participate in the local emergency planning process and provide information on chemical risks at their facility. LEPCs and TEPCs would be able to include these facilities also in their emergency plan.

### LEPCs and TEPCs

LEPCs and TEPCs play a key role in meeting the goals of EPCRA. They are required to develop and implement an emergency plan for their community, as well as to ensure that the people in the community are aware of the chemical risks and know what to do if a chemical accident occurs. It is important that the members of the LEPC or TEPC represent all stakeholders in their community. EPCRA states that LEPC or TEPC membership shall include, at a minimum, representatives from these entities:

- Elected state
   and local
   officials
- Law enforcement
- Civil defense
- Transportation

- Broadcast and print media
- Hospital
- Fire fighters
- First aid
- Local environmental
- Health
- Community
   groups
- Facility owners and/or operators

Representatives from each of these organizations play an important role in developing the local emergency plan and protecting the public during chemical emergencies.

For many communities, a successful LEPC or TEPC acts as a forum to support the overall emergency management program within the community. Stakeholders bring their specific expertise and talents into the planning process to ensure all elements of the plan are appropriately addressed. For example, facility owners and operators who know and understand the chemical risks at their facility can assist the LEPC or the TEPC in identifying actions to take in order to prepare for and respond to a chemical accident. Members of the public also have a role to play in assisting the LEPC or the TEPC in understanding the unique needs of the community regarding communication about the chemical risks and emergency response procedures. For example, individuals with special medical needs, such as the elderly, disabled/handicapped, children, and those with transportation challenges. Tailoring outreach to meet the specific considerations of the local community is key to enabling effective participation in the

planning process and an efficient response to ensure safety of the public. LEPCs and TEPCs must appoint a chairperson and establish rules by which the committee shall function. Rules shall include:

- Public notification of committee activities, and
- Public meetings to discuss the emergency plan, public comments, response to such comments by the committee, and distribution of the emergency plan.

The emergency plan should include:

- Facilities that handle EHSs and transportation routes of EHSs, as well as any facilities designated by the SERC or TERC
- Emergency response procedures for facility owners and operators, as well as for local emergency and medical personnel
- Designation of a community and a facility emergency coordinator to implement the plan
- Procedures for notifying the public and the local emergency response team that a release has occurred
- Methods for determining the occurrence of a chemical release
- Determination of the probable area and population affected by potential releases, including considerations of environmental justice, vulnerable residents, fence-line communities, etc.
- Identification of emergency response equipment in the community and at the facilities in the community, and the persons responsible for them (including identification of the response capabilities of regulated facilities)
- Evacuation plans (including evacuation routes and shelter-in-place procedures)
- Training program for emergency responders (including schedules)
- Methods and schedules for exercising emergency response plan.

An incident in one community may affect other communities. LEPCs and TEPCs should consult with other LEPCs and TEPCs near their emergency planning districts to coordinate planning efforts and potential mutual response support during an incident. Additionally, LEPCs and TEPCs should consider the unique challenges of industrial parks (i.e., clustering of facilities) and their potential for impacts to adjacent facilities and fence-line communities.

LEPCs and TEPCs are required to review the emergency plan at least once a year or more frequently when changes occur in the community. To accomplish this, LEPCs and TEPCs should meet regularly to review and exercise the plan and update it as necessary. Conducting emergency plan exercises are important to ensure that the plan includes all necessary elements and any gaps or areas that need improvement are identified. Emergency plan exercises would benefit emergency responders to be better prepared for an incident.

# Developing an Emergency Response Plan

With the information obtained from facilities under Section 302, LEPCs and TEPCs are required to develop the local emergency response plan for their community. There are approximately 90,000 facilities covered by Section 302. EPCRA authorizes LEPCs and TEPCs to obtain any information from these facilities necessary to develop or update the emergency response plan. Necessary information includes identification of chemicals of concern, identification of serious events that can lead to releases, amounts of toxic material or energy that could be released, predicted consequences of the release and associated damages, and prevention measures in place at the facility.

## Emergency Planning for Hazardous Chemicals reported under the Community Right-to-Know sections of EPCRA

With approximately 400,000 facilities reporting under Section 311 and 312, the chemical information provided by these facilities offers a wealth of additional information that can be useful to first responders, LEPCs, and TEPCs in the local planning process. LEPCs and TEPCs should use information received under Sections 311, 312, and 302 to develop, implement, and update the emergency response plan. It is critically important that first responder organizations make full use of the chemical hazard information for appropriate training and to minimize the risks to fire-fighters, medics and hazmat teams when responding to an emergency.

The Tier II form under Section 312 requires specific information on facilities that handle hazardous chemicals. Beyond the requirements for specific information about the facility (e.g., the address of the location where hazardous chemicals are stored, latitude and longitude, maximum number of occupants, and whether the facility is manned or unmanned), the form now requires facilities to provide contact information for the facility emergency coordinator. This one-time notification required under Section 302 was originally provided by the facilities that existed when the law was passed in 1986. Requirements to update this information may have been overlooked by some facilities; they are now required to report this information annually on the Tier II form. In addition to the emergency contact information, facilities are required to provide contact information for the person responsible for the content of the Tier II form. The additional requirements on the Tier II form were published in the Federal Register notice on July 12, 2012 (77 FR 41314), effective January 1, 2014.

Regarding chemical information, the Tier II form requires facilities to report specific information on hazardous chemicals, such as the amounts (in ranges), locations, and the potential hazards related to those chemicals. This information can supplement the information provided by facilities under Section 302 for local emergency planning. It can assist LEPCs and TEPCs in updating their emergency plan. Additionally, some facilities should have an emergency plan in place for potential chemical accidents at their facility. One important issue to address in the local emergency plan is to ensure that either the facility itself or the public emergency responders have the capabilities to respond to a chemical release at a facility.

LEPCs and TEPCs should use all information received under EPCRA and from chemical facilities to assist them in developing an emergency response plan that addresses chemical risks to the community.

## **Emergency Planning for Substances in Transportation**

Although EPCRA provides an exemption for facilities from reporting substances in transportation for emergency planning purposes, chemicals in transportation or facilities that are involved in chemical transportation operations should also be included in the local emergency plan. Section 303 requires LEPCs and TEPCs to identify transportation routes of EHSs as part of the planning process. LEPCs and TEPCs should consider including substances other than EHSs in transportation. Many transportation-related incidents involved other substances which have adversely affected the community and require response actions to be taken by local responders.

Some recent incidents involving crude oil transported by rail have significantly impacted communities. These incidents compelled the federal government to implement more protective regulations. The US Department of Transportation issued an Emergency Order (<u>USDOT Emergency Order on Transport of Bakken Crude Oil</u>) requiring railroads that operate trains moving large quantities to notify the SERCs and TERCs about the operation of these trains through their states or tribes. As of June 2014, SERCs began to receive such notifications under this EO. TERCS may reach out to SERCs to obtain information on trains operating through the tribal lands. SERCs and TERCs should be sharing the information with local emergency planners and responders so that LEPCs and TEPCs can include these operations in the local emergency plan. On May 28, 2015 the DOT announced that the Emergency Order will remain in full force and effect until further notice while the DOT considers options for codifying the Order disclosure requirement. The DOT notice is available: <u>http://www.phmsa.dot.gov/hazmat/phmsa-notice-regarding-emergency-response-notifications-for-shipments-of-petroleum-crude-oil-by-rail</u>.

LEPCs and TEPCs should use their authority provided in Section 303 to request information from facilities for substances that may be in transportation through their community. This will allow emergency responders to be prepared for any chemical-related transportation incident.

### **Tools for Planning and Response**

Facilities subject to EPCRA requirements submit their reports to the SERCs, TERCs, LEPCs, TEPCs and their local fire department. Reports include the amount (in ranges), locations and potential hazards of chemicals present on site. To assist state, tribal, and local agencies in collecting, managing, and using this information, EPA and the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) created the <u>Computer-Aided</u> <u>Management of Emergency Operations (CAMEO)</u>. CAMEO is a system of software applications used to plan for and respond to chemical emergencies. CAMEO assists chemical emergency planners and responders to access, store, and evaluate information critical for developing emergency plans.

There are four integrated programs within CAMEO:

 Facility and chemical data management

- Air dispersion modeling
- Mapping application
- Chemical properties and hazards

## Fire Departments Role in Emergency Planning

Representatives of the fire service play a key role in implementing EPCRA. Since fire departments are often the first to respond to an emergency, they should be active in the emergency planning process for their community. EPCRA Sections 311 and 312 require facilities to submit MSDSs (or SDSs) or a list of hazardous chemicals along with the Tier II form to their local fire department and to the SERC (or TERC) and LEPC (or TEPC). Having access to this information enables fire departments that respond to chemical emergencies to know which chemicals, as well as their quantities and locations they can expect to find at the scene. Fire departments should inspect facilities that handle hazardous chemicals using the authority provided under Section 312. As part of an onsite inspection, facilities are required to provide location information of all hazardous chemicals present at the facility. Fire departments are encouraged to use this authority to understand the chemical risks at each facility in order to appropriately respond to those risks. As noted above, it is critically important that first responder organizations make full use of the chemical hazard information for appropriate training and to minimize the risks to fire-fighters, medics and hazmat teams when responding to an emergency.

It is also important to keep an open dialogue with facility personnel to ensure facility participation in the development and implementation of the local emergency plan. Facilities subject to emergency planning under Section 302 are required to provide the name of a facility representative to participate in the planning process. Facilities subject to Section 312 Tier II reporting are required to appoint an emergency contact who can be reached in the event of an incident to assist the fire fighters. These facility representatives can help the fire department in planning and fostering communication before and during response to an incident. Facilities in your community may offer training, technical assistance and resources for responding to chemical emergencies.

# **Collaboration and Outreach with Stakeholders**

# Working with Chemical Facilities on planning and prevention

There may be facilities in the community that are not aware of EPCRA and its reporting requirements. SERCs, TERCs, LEPCs and TEPCs should reach out to facilities in their community. Outreach could include compliance workshops and electronic media. Many SERCs and LEPCs have published EPCRA outreach materials to educate facilities and the public. EPA encourages collaboration through outreach to facilities to illustrate the importance of public safety and the need to comply with EPCRA, as well as steps that can be taken to prevent chemical accidents. These steps could include reducing inventories of chemicals, reducing shipments or adjusting transportation routes away

from vulnerable populations, and working with adjacent chemical facilities to reduce the potential for "domino" effects from a chemical accident.

With regard to enforcement efforts, if facilities fail to comply, then SERCs, TERCs, LEPCs and TEPCs may use the authority provided in EPCRA Section 326 to file civil enforcement action against facilities. SERCs, TERCs, LEPCs and TEPCs may also refer facilities to EPA to take enforcement action, if necessary.

### Engaging the Community

LEPCs and TEPCs serve as a community focal point for information and discussion about hazardous substances, emergency planning, and health and environmental risks. Engaging and educating the community is an important part of meeting the goals of EPCRA, especially for those members of the community identified in the local response plan that could be directly affected by the impacts of a chemical accident. Section 301 contains provisions for LEPCs and TEPCs to notify the public of its activities and hold public meetings to discuss the emergency plan with the community, educate the public about chemical risks, and share information on what is to be done during an emergency (i.e., evacuation or shelter-in-place). LEPCs and TEPCs are responsible for ensuring that procedures are in place for notifying the public when a chemical accident occurs (via reverse 911 or other system) and ensuring that the public understands what to do when they receive that information. To facilitate this, LEPCs and TEPCs should encourage the public and community groups to become LEPC or TEPC members, participate in the planning process, and promote participation in emergency exercises. Additionally, LEPCs and TEPCs should consider focused outreach (i.e., addressing language and cultural issues) to vulnerable, sensitive, and low income members of the community to assist them in effectively participating in the local planning meetings, understanding risk issues, and what to do when an accident occurs.

### ENGAGING FACILITIES

LEPCs / TEPCs should educate facilities that are unaware of EPCRA reporting requirements and provide assistance to facilities to comply with EPCRA reporting requirements. In addition, LEPCs/TEPCs should work with facilities to identify actions which could be taken to reduce chemical risks to the community.

Ways in which LEPCs / TEPCs can reach out to facilities is by sending letters, as well as brochures and outreach materials to facilities in your community that cover the requirements of EPCRA - including penalties for noncompliance. Outreach may also include holding public meetings or workshops for local facilities to explain the reporting process and the information which is needed for reporting, as well as participating in the development of the local emergency plan.

In addition, LEPCs / TEPCs should encourage facility owners and operators to become members of the LEPC / TEPC and be a part of the planning process. Facilities are prime resources to assist LEPCs / TEPCs in explaining potential chemical risks to the community.

Another approach to gather needed facility and chemical information is for LEPCs / TEPCs to use questionnaires requesting facilities to provide information on available resources, emergency response training held at the facilities, emergency response equipment, and so forth. This information is invaluable during the LEPC / TEPC emergency planning process.

### Public Access to Information under EPCRA

SERCs, TERCs, LEPCs and TEPCs receive reports and notifications under EPCRA from facilities covered under the requirements. EPCRA requires that this information be made available to the public. Fence-line Communities located close to chemical facilities will find this information useful to help them understand chemical risks and prepare for chemical accidents. Information that would be most helpful includes:

- The local response plan that identifies the potential chemical risks to their community and response actions to be taken;
- How the public will receive information on these risks, as well as how they will
  receive notification when a chemical accident occurs; and
- What they need to do to prepare for a chemical accident and how to protect themselves once they receive the notification that a chemical accident has occurred.

SERCs, TERCs, LEPCs and TEPCs are required to establish procedures for processing and receiving requests from the public as well as providing that information to community members. Procedures may include setting-up a reading room, establishing hours of operation, determining if copies of the reports can be made, and determining if service fees will be charged.



Knowledge of the municipality – its residents, land use, hazards, geography, infrastructure, economics, culture and critical facilities – is also essential for disaster recovery. After an incident occurs, local officials collect 9/26/2017 New Jersey Office of Emergency Management - County Emergency Management - Coordinator's Association - Family and Community Emergency

disaster intelligence – information concerning death, injuries, damage assessments, roads, utilities, housing conditions, etc. The more credible and more accurate the intelligence, the better case that can be made for a request for disaster recovery assistance. If a Presidential disaster declaration is received, FEMA will look to local counterparts to help them tour affected areas and begin the process for damage claims.

One of the less-emphasized responsibilities of the LEPC has been is its role as a focal point for community members regarding discussions about hazards, emergency planning, and the heatth and environmental risks of disasters. Officens should expect the LEPC to be able reply to questions about what hazards the community faces and address concerns about how prepared the community is to respond to them.

An NJOEM post-September 11th survey of New Jersey's municipal emergency management agencies revealed that 92% describe their LEPC's as "active." Cranford Township Police Chief/Emergency Management Coordinator Harry Wilde takes it a step further - "...our LEPC is constantly evolving... a resource which should be prioritized and targeted where needed...heavily influenced by current events."

Chief Wilde chairs a 20+ member LEPC, assigning members into subcommittees which meet on an as-needed basis. Over his 10-year term, he's relied on Mayors to play an active role in the process and hasn't been disappointed. "Our Mayor has always chosen to be active in the LEPC process – particularly when communicating hazard information to residents. When a crises hits, this sends an important message about where the town is at and where it's going."

Cranford's also forged an important partnership with their local access television station which serves 6 communities and 80,000 residents. They can "go live" with public information from the 9-1-1 center at the flip of a switch, "Different mayors have different communication styles, but when the chief elected official speaks directly to community members, they pay attention to what's going on."

When the stakes are high Wilde expands the LEPC team to meet the need, taking disaster history and expertise of the LEPC member into account. "In a flood event," he explains, "we know who gets notified and who to bring in when the telemetry reaches certain stages."

Appointing the Cranford Superintendent of Schools as an LEPC member has also increased the quality of decisions about school crises issues. Wilde explains that, "During the World Trade Center incident many communities closed schools early, but the Superintendent and I Jointly agreed that it would be a lot safer for klds if we kept schools open. We didn't want to create a situation with a lot of latchkey kids, especially in light of what was being broadcast on television. If the Superintendent had unilaterally made a decision about an unplanned school closing, it could have caused the town a lot of problems."

Wilde's also enthusiastic about an upcoming school project with the FirstData corporation, "Operation Safe and Secure." This initiative will help middle school students develop confidence in their school's own safety systems, heighten security awareness, lessen anxiety and provide cursory skills in safety and risk management. The students will experience hands-on learning about structural, environmental, and social techniques to mitigate dangers.

"An LEPC should work the Mayor and Emergency Management Coordinator to constantly examine contemporary problems, assess their impact on the community and use time-tested methods - emergency planning, training, and exercising – to reduce risk to community members," Wilde said.

LEPC members' contributions are essential to an effective emergency management program. If a municipality views LEPC formation as a paperwork exercise, then it will become just an administrative burden having no value to the community. When given appropriate executive and financial support, the LEPC enables a municipality to respond as a coordinated, effective unit ready to address residents' needs when disaster strikes.
